As Quakers, we are led by our testimony to equality to challenge the current economic system, which causes huge inequalities, and to seek alternative models for a fairer society. We recognise the close connection between equality and sustainability, and are exploring what sort of economic system is needed if we are to live within the constraints of the Earth's natural resources. Working with and on behalf of local Quaker meetings, Britain Yearly Meeting initiates and supports campaigns for economic justice and provides newsletters, briefings and presentations to inspire further discussion and action.
