

#### **Elders and overseers**

#### Introduction

"The work of eldership and oversight is mainly carried out locally. Those responsible for pastoral care will need wisdom and sensitivity. Their ability to inform, advise and counsel will often be called on."

Quaker faith & practice 12.10

Elders are responsible for fostering the spiritual life of a Quaker meeting, while overseers ensure the pastoral care of individuals and the worshipping community. Friends with responsibility for eldership and oversight in your local meeting are your first port of call for consultation and help with any problems. Overseers can always call upon elders, and vice versa, and holding joint meetings on a regular basis can be a great source of strength. Friends can also ask their area meeting elders and overseers for help when it is needed.

We support elders and overseers by providing training and resources. We also offer activities they might want to consider to help them meet the spiritual and pastoral needs of their worshipping community.
