


UK military deaths in Afghanistan: How they died

Other deaths: Some deaths in Afghanistan have occurred as a result of causes other than hostile action or accidents. There have been a small number of suicides and troops killed in so-called "friendly fire" incidents. The cause of some deaths is still under investigation.



Physical injury	7,300 were treated in field hospital for battlefield injuries, non-combat wounds or disease. 220,000 British personnel have served so far in the Iraq and Afghan campaigns.	7	0.033	0.231
Mental health problems such as PTSD	Figures are disputed. Help for Heroes say 59,992 (27.2 per cent)	8	0.272	2.176




