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6. Friends Trusts Limited report

Friends Trusts Limited (FTL) is a company limited by guarantee. It is the 'custodian trustee' or 'nominee' for Meetings and other bodies within Britain Yearly Meeting. This means that property and financial investments are held in FTL's name, on behalf of the Area Meetings and other bodies that occupy, use and maintain the buildings and spend the income that the investments generate.

Over 450 properties are held on behalf of more than 70 Area Meetings and other Quaker bodies. FTL holds more than 130 investments on behalf 60+ beneficial owners.

Most Area Meetings therefore need to liaise with Friends Trusts Ltd when purchasing, selling, leasing or otherwise disposing of property.

FTL also manages a number of Quaker trusts with a total value over £7 million. Their financial management is overseen by Britain Yearly Meeting Trustees Investment Committee, on which FTL is represented.

8. **New ways into membership: A proposal from a working group of Quaker Life Central Committee**

The only way to become a member of Britain Yearly Meeting (BYM) is through a relationship with an area meeting. This doesn't fit the circumstances of many Friends – such as young people with no settled base and Friends whose Quaker identity and practice are genuine but located other than in a local community. A rapid growth of online communities, meetings and groups, alongside a lessening of Friends' ties with a 'place' of worship, brings a pressing need for more flexible ways into membership. Having explored these questions over a number of years from various angles, Quaker Life Central Committee now proposes another path to membership.

Many Friends have their strongest Quaker connections and their main experience of Quaker fellowship, worship and practice with non-geographic groups, including online worshipping communities and other groups with a community and/or worship focus.

The proposal is to create an AM-like body, the “anchor meeting”, with authority to confer membership on Friends associated with such groups, referred to as “home meetings”. The primary purpose of each group need not be affected, other than to enable membership processes to be held within a framework of spiritual and pastoral care. This new virtual structure will replicate that of local and area meetings and their relationship with BYM, allowing non-geographic and geographic Quaker communities to co-exist equally. The model anticipates organic development of a fully integrated BYM structure of physical locations, online elements, and hybrid communities combining both. The proposals describe how all this could work

10. Introduction to Reparation

The Quakers in Britain Trustees' Reparation Working Group (RWG) was established in autumn 2023, in response to minutes 27 & 33 of Yearly Meeting 2022, to examine British Quakers' historical involvement in enslavement and colonialism, and to consider what reparation requires of us today. The Group will be laid down in December 2027, by which time it will bring recommendations to British Friends.

The RWG comprises six members representing Quaker Central Committees or BYM Trustees, and two Friends from the Black, Brown and People of Colour Friends Fellowship, supported by co-opted specialists and a full-time Reparation Co-ordinator. Since 2023 its work has spanned four workstreams: historical research, networking and listening, theological research, and finance.

We will hear prepared ministry from the Co-clerks of the BYM Trustees Reparation Working Group.

13. Worship to uphold those suffering for their faith

One of the responsibilities of Yearly Meeting in session, which has been taken on from Meeting for Sufferings, is to maintain a prison and court register. The register consists of the names of Friends who have been before the courts for matters of conscience, i.e. Friends who come into conflict with the law when acting under concern and bearing witness to the truth as revealed to them.

The purposes of recording an entry in the register are:

1. to enter the details of the matter into the permanent records of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers), acknowledging Friends' witness and their willingness to face its consequences,
2. to remind ourselves that being a Quaker does not come without cost,
3. to record the Society's prayerful upholding of Friends who are suffering for their faith, and
4. to serve as a record of the actions of the State in restricting our freedom to worship and witness.

Inclusion of information in the prison and court register does not imply that Meeting for Sufferings itself has tested the Friend's concern and necessarily agrees with or condones their action.

We will spend time together in worship upholding those Friends who have been before the courts for matters of conscience. Our worship will be supported and introduced by the Yearly Meeting Elders.

Final minute

Quakers share a way of life, not a set of beliefs. Quaker unity is based on shared understanding and a shared practice of silent worship – a communal stillness.

Quakers seek to experience God directly – internally, in relationships with others, and with the world. Local meetings for worship are open to all who wish to attend.

Quakers try to live with honesty and integrity. This means speaking truth to all, including people in positions of power. The Quaker commitment to peace arises from the conviction that love is at the heart of existence and that all human beings are unique and equal.

This leads Quakers to put faith into action by working locally and globally to change the systems that cause injustice and violent conflict.
